In Kathmandu, dire poverty forces thousands of people to make a living by picking through rubbish along rivers and in drainage ditches. With a local NGO, PSD, we are identifying and working with child waste pickers living in recycling centers. We currently have 15 children in our program; all of them are enrolled in school and receive school supplies, new uniforms and shoes. In the past these children never had proper book bags, pencils, or notebook to do their homework and many have never been to school.

The Nepal program also participates in WASH workshops for personal hygiene with the families, and the program provides an annual health check-up. To ensure that the children eat one decent meal, and that the parents do not have to depend on their children's income, the Unforgotten Fund is providing supplemental monthly food rations.

Working with PSD, we are looking to expand the program and help additional wastepicker children. We are also planning to work with a local orphanage in Kathmandu. We need your support, every donation will get to the field to help those struggling to survive in extreme poverty.



We have also set up an Unforgotten Learning Center in Nepal. This Center will provide afterschool tutoring and host our WASH workshops. Our budget for expanding the program and expanding services at the Learning Center is \$60/per child/per month. In the future we hope to start a computer learning program here for the students.

UNFF Wastepicker Projects

Yemen: In December 2021, we launched a project to assist child wastepickers in the capital city of Sana'a. Seven years of a military stalemate in the country continues to take a heavy toll on civilians. We currently have 5 children in the program, they have enrolled in school and we have established a bike program for transportation, as well as nutritional assistance for their families.

Zambia: Our longest running program, we began enrolling our first group of child wastepickers from the Chingwere district of Lusaka in school, in partnership with Mapalo Trust School, in 2011. We are seeing participants from that first group of student start University, a true testament to their perseverance! We are also expanding this program by building a computer lab and learning center.



Djibouti: In 2021, we launched a program supporting child wastepickers at the Chabelley Dump in Djibouti City. More than 100 children live there in makeshift shelters, shifting through trash for pieces to sell or food to eat. We currently support 15 children under the age of 10 and have enrolled them in school as well as provided them with clothing, school supplies, and daily lunches. We are planning to add job skills training at a later stage for the older children.
